1. As per the diplomatic contingency plan provisions to respond to allegations of abuse, grateful you take the following steps to seek to have the allegations investigated. It is important that all representations to Afghan authorities be consistent with the detainee's express wishes that his name be withheld. We are unclear whether the detainee's request also extended to withholding his name from the ICRC or the AIHRC, however consistent with standard international practice, unless the detainee has clearly indicated that his name can be passed on to those specific organizations, his name should also be withheld in this instance. That being said, the location of the alleged abuse and the form of abuse should be relayed to Afghan authorities to investigate. We would also ask that you raise with Afghan authorities the fact that the allegations if true, would be a matter of considerable concern for the Government of Canada

Grateful therefore if you undertake, as a matter of priority, the following actions:

Delegation should raise the allegations with both the AIHRC and the ICRC on a priority basis to enable both organizations to fulfil their mandates with respect to treatment of prisoners. Please note that visits to assess the overall conditions of the facilities have been conducted on several occasions by CSC and PRT Engineers as part of on-going PRT capacity-building initiatives.).
- Private interviews were conducted with individuals identified. These included detainee no.; no CF detainee number available). All

acknowledged being originally detained by the Canadian Forces and being transferred to the NDS prior to being transferred to Sarposa Prison. Of note, all interviewees commented that they were not aware of the specific reasons for their detention.

individuals appeared in good physical condition and confirmed that they had access to medical services and medicines (albeit rudimentary) at Sarposa prison. In terms of exercise and access to fresh air, unrestricted access to the prison's courtyard and garden was provided except at night. All individuals interviewed were generally satisfied with their treatment and their conditions of detention at Sarposa Prison although each of them complained about the quality of food received (note, however, this is the same food provided to prison guards and management). Access to a courtyard and garden was provided throughout the day but while in custody of the NDS ndicated having been seen restricted at night.

When responding to questions pertaining to judicial access (as per SOPs), interviewees unanimously complained about the lack of transparency in their arrest (including reasons for detention by the CF) and ensuing legal proceedings. In this context, all indicated that

they were told to sign documents (usumb print) without having read their contents.

One concern identified was that the individuals interviewed were shackled (chained at the ankies). While members of the team originally believed this to be a precautionary measure adopted by Sarposa Prison officials to safeguard Canadian representatives during conduct of detainees interviewed claimed that their shackles had not been removed since being in custody of the NDS. While no sores, welts or chaffing were evident, in one case shackles would have been worn for over four months, 18 individuals were believed to have been in shackles since their detention by the NDS. This was the first time that a CSC representative witnessed in-mates shackled at Sarposa Prison.



Inform AIHRC and the ICRC of the alleged mis-treatment and request their assistance in following up as appropriate.
 - As a matter of priority, concerns regarding the extended use of shackles for security-related detainees will be raised with Sarposa Prison authorities. Depending on the outcome discussions with Sarposa Prison authorities, consideration should be given to providing infrastructure upgrades to Sarposa Prison facilities as part of CSC's on-going capacity-building efforts so as to mitigate the need for shackles to be worn on a continuous basis.

The issue of delays in judicial processes was one of the issues raised at a recent human rights workshop hosted by the PRT and AIHRC, and several participants expressed interest in future collaboration to address the problem. 	The main issue is simply the lack of judges who are available to hear National Security cases. The Public-Security division of the High Court of Kandahar, which is supposed to hear National-Security cases, does not have any judge at the moment. The General Crime division of the High Court of Kandahar, which is responsible to hear appeals for National-Security cases,
