

Advocacy & Legal Resources

It can be very difficult to find low-cost or free legal assistance, although many organizations and groups offer at least some kind of summary legal advice or advocacy services. This list includes a wide range of groups who may be able to assist you. Not all of these agencies will be relevant to your particular legal issues, so please read the descriptions before deciding which to contact. In addition, this is not a complete list; there are other organizations who offer various kinds of direct assistance as well. If you know of an organization you think should be added to the list, please let us know.

Most of these services, especially the ones that allow you to meet with a lawyer, only schedule short appointments. Given these time constraints, it is best to be as prepared as possible before making contact. Have a clear idea of what questions you need answered and make sure your relevant documents are organized.

Lawyer Referral

Lawyer Referral facilitates a 30-minute consultation with a lawyer for \$25 plus taxes. Inform the lawyer you have gone through Lawyer Referral, keep track of the time, and determine the hourly rate should you extend the consultation.

Legal Aid

Legal Aid provides subsidized legal services, ranging from legal information and advice to legal representation, in the areas of criminal, family and immigration law. Legal aid is limited to criminal charges, mental health or prison issues, serious family problems or serious immigration problems. Applicants must meet financial guidelines to be eligible. http://www.lss.bc.ca/legal_aid/

Access Pro Bono Society

Access Pro Bono operates free legal clinics at several locations across the Lower Mainland and British Columbia to provide legal advice and assist in the preparation of legal cases. Certain locations specialize in different aspects of law.

The BC Centre for Elder Advocacy and Support runs an Elder Law Clinic, which offers free legal advice and representation to older adults. Legal services are provided to clients who are over 55 (or the legal representative of someone 55+), would not otherwise be able to retain a lawyer (usually due to low income) and have legal problems in their service priority areas. http://site.bcceas.ca/

Pivot Legal Society

Justice Access Centre

Has offices throughout BC. Assists Indigenous people with the police or courts: assistance preparing for court, accompaniment to court, speaking on behalf of individuals in court. They also offer services related to drug and alcohol addiction.

MPA Society Vancouver Court Program

The MPA Society supports individuals with mental illness who need help navigating the criminal justice system, finding a lawyer, or other kinds of advocacy and support related to criminal justice proceedings. Although preference is given to those living with mental illness, a diagnosis isn't necessary to access services.

Can assist with segregation issues, disciplinary hearings, involuntary transfers, parole suspensions, detention hearings and sentence calculation, as well as other issues.

YWCA Legal Educator (a service for women)

Offers 30-minute free legal advice appointments on the second and fourth Thursday of each month to women survivors of violence with child welfare and family law issues.

Duty Counsel

The Legal Services Society pays for family duty counsel to assist people with family law issues in both the Provincial and BC Supreme Courts.
